

Episode 16: Free Falling

Clip: The Fouetté

Activity: Background to the Fouetté

Theme: Dance Knowledge

- 1. As a class, view the clip, *The Fouetté*, where Tara is made to perform multiple fouettés: a turn on one leg, with the 'working leg' extending to the front, whipping to the side, and the lower leg coming into 'retire' (foot to the knee of the 'supporting leg').
- 2. Discuss the physical skill needed to perform a fouetté with the students. Ask students to reflect on what the dancer must concentrate on in order to perfect such a skill. A properly executed series of fouettés, with perfect placement and no movement from the spot, separates great from good technicians. Principal dancers are often required to perform 32 fouettés in ballets such as Swan Lake and Don Quixote. The first dancer to perform 32 fouettés was Pierina Legnani of St Petersburg Imperial Ballet in a performance of Cinderella. This feat was repeated in many performances around the world and became so popular with audiences that they would count aloud how many turns the prima ballerina performed. Look at this online example: 32 single and double fouettés performed by Gillian Murphy of the American Ballet Theatre
- 3. *Have the class practice a fouetté. Count how many fouettés each of the students can perform as a series. Select students from the class to be the judges and find the two most competent students. Set up a small competition where there is a fouetté duel between the two students with a prize going to the winner.

*Safety Note: do not perform turns on carpet – there is great risk of knee dislocation and ankle injury. Use flooring that has some give but is not excessively slippery.

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4. Divide the class into smaller groups: historians, researchers, and illustrators. Each group will carry out a specific task:


- a. Researchers will look for good examples of fouettés online and look for tips or instructions for performing a series of fouettés (there are several blogs on the subject, some entries are better written than others). The researchers will pass the tips and instructions they find onto teachers.
- b. Historians will research the ballets in which an audience is likely to see 16–32 fouettés performed. They will look for dancers who have been/are famous for their execution of fouettés and search for reviews and comments made regarding the performance of fouettés.
- c. *Illustrators* will look in books, magazines, and online for images and illustrations of dancers performing fouettés.
- Using Student Activity Sheet E16.1: Background to the Fouetté, all students are to collect, select, arrange and present the results of their research to the class.
